"....Rounding up this sequence is Nine Old Men/Big Dog's?, pictures of which have been posted on site as B-24H-15-DT #41-28815 of 739<sup>th</sup> BS. I know that some sources have matched these names with this serial, but I'm afraid this is in error. Attached are two pics of the real 41-28815 on which Douglas line number 407 is partially visible, matching serial on tail present on one of the pics. This event took place on 4 August 1944, a non-operational day for the 454<sup>th</sup> BG, when pilot Arthur F. Hogan of 739<sup>th</sup> BS suffered this accident. Unless there's some flaw in the records, this same aircraft, then assigned to 736<sup>th</sup> BS instead, had been the object of an earlier accident on 30 March 1944, this time with Leroy H. Beck of at the controls. To complicate matters further, MACR #7200 reports the loss on 10 August 1944 of a B-24 with this same serial number flown by 2/Lt. Harold C. Mortenson, but this is quite clearly in error, as the accident on the 4 of the same month had destroyed the aircraft beyond economical repair. This is proven by an eyewitness report in the MACR, where Sgt. Marvin Talasnik refers to this a/c as #608 instead. Although this could be 41-28608, it may as well have been another 608, because an earlier MACR, #6592 reports the loss of 41-28608; so, unless it landed at some other field and managed to return to the group after repairs, 41-28608 looks unlikely for the #608 mentioned. So the real identity of Nine Old Men/Big Dog's? is unfortunately unknown; it could be a H-DT, but the pics are not sharp enough to be sure...."
